	Strategic Needs Assessment shows us that hearing impairment needs across Torbay have fallen, with this need representing less than 1% of all special educational needs in the Bay, with those higher-level hearing impairment needs being less than ten families in total across the primary and secondary age ranges. In February 2024, a SEND Needs Analysis was carried out on children who had an EHCP or on SEN Support at their school. For those with a HI as their primary area of need and in receipt of an EHCP, this equates to 0.7% of the total EHCPs. When comparing this to those with an SEMH need, which is where the repurposed places are going to be supporting, this is at 25% of the total EHCPs. However, it is important to acknowledge that when a child requires support due to a hearing impairment that this is often highly complex.	will enable us to target resources most effectively.
